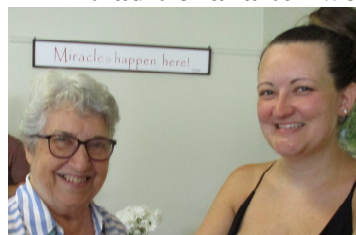
There are many opportunities to help with this project such as sending birthday and holiday cards to the residents. If you would like to know more about helping with this project please let Linda know. (315-945-1320)

Vicar's Reflections

I always bring a good book along with me for spiritual renewal when I'm away on vacation. This past month, when at Myrtle Beach, I chose the book *Hope in Times of Fear*, by Timothy Keller. Keller describes what the Church is called to be by quoting from the Apostle Paul, who makes a stark contrast between "those whose mind is set on earthly things," and those whose "citizenship is in heaven."¹ The original word he uses for citizenship is "politeuma,"² which could also be translated as a commonwealth. The English word for politics evolved from this word, and it depicts something about God's intention for the Church.

We are meant to be a community that has both laws and loyalties based on the life of heaven. The Church is not simply a collection of individuals who are forgiven. We have a more significant objective than mere self-fulfillment. Saint Peter calls us "a holy nation, distinct and set apart for the purpose of declaring the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light."³ We are far from perfect, but God is not finished with us yet. There is much work to be done as we endeavor to show the world what a new humanity can be as we allow the Holy Spirit to heal the sinful effects of sin that cause us all to fall short of His glory.
