The Vestry voted to send \$1,000 to the Diocesan relief fund for aid to Ukraine. The funds will go to provide food, clothing, and shelter for the Ukrainian people.

Celebrating All Saints Day

Our Church calendar for the month of November begins with the celebration of "All Saints Day." If you are unfamiliar with the background of this feast, liturgical churches use this particular day to celebrate saints who have not gained significant distinction. Some might describe the saints we celebrate on this day as more down-to-earth but attractively human. Therefore, the saints that we salute and recognize on this day are a little more ordinary than the saints who have their own named feast days, or who are famed for startling visions or for leading history-altering crusades. Instead, this celebration is about people expressing their love for God in humble, quiet ways.

One of the reasons that I cherish our congregation is that your love for each other is evident in tangible, practical, and personal ways. Most of the time our parishioners simply do their

jobs and help others when needed . There are times, however, when people share stories or ask sincere questions about their struggles and doubts. This sharing often takes place during our Coffee and Contemplation session on Sunday mornings. Not everyone is comfortable with sharing, since many grew up in Churches where such discussions were private. But we can all grow in our faith by hearing others' experiences and stories. We can also encourage each other with whatever gifts we have. The Church is a body of people called to be a light in a dark world. Your service may not be evangelism or openly sharing your faith, but your light is precious, whether it draws much attention or not. The Spirit that is alive in you makes a difference; for this reason, you are called salt and light (See Matthew 5:13-16). So let's be that salt, and let's be that light. *Amen.*
